

Watson Profile- Box Divvy

Box Divvy is a fantastic fresh food co-op that is taking on major supermarkets, paying Aussie farmers well, and reducing food bills by more than half - all while lowering the refrigeration, transport & packaging impact on the environment.

What's the catch? Believe it or not, there isn't one.

Our very own Watson Hub is the first Box Divvy co-op to be running in the Inner North. The more households that join our coop, the greater our bulk buying power becomes.



The ordering system lets you choose what you want,

it's not the typical "get what you're given" box. There's also much more on offer than just fresh fruit and veggies - there are eggs, meat, seafood, raw honey, spices, bread, legumes, and pantry basics.

Our group order is sent off on Monday night, Box Divvy purchases everything for us direct from farmers on Tuesday and delivers it to me on Wednesday. As your hubster, I then get to work divvying up the boxes for collection or delivery from my home on Stow Place from 3pm.



If you want to save money, engage in the community and help shake up the produce industry - give it a go! ... and if it's not for you? Cancel anytime.

A Watson Weed

These glossy leaves are the top growth of a nasty weed which is spreading in Watson. It has been found under the trees on the east side of Block 76



(between Aspinall St and the Federal Highway) and in the Mount Majura nature reserve and probably it could be in your garden too. It has a pretty name, bridal creeper, Asparagus asparagoides, but it is a Weed of National Significance because it invades bushland and smothers native plants. It produces small green berries after flowering and these turn red with small black seeds. Birds eat the berries and carry the seeds into the bush and gardens. It can also be spread by fragments of the bulbous roots, shown in the second picture.

The Friends of Mount Majura don't want to see this creeper spreading through our wonderful wildflowers so please check in your yard. If you find any small plants remove them, carefully dig out the roots and place everything inside a double bag, leave to cook in the sun for a while and then put in your landfill bin, NOT in your green bin, NOT in your home compost. And check the spot again later to see if any more come up. (An alternative treatment is glyphosate Roundup spot sprayed or painted on the leaves.)

If you find a large vine it would be best to notify the ACT Invasive Weeds



Control Program ACTBiosecurity@act.gov.au and they may be able to help.

Watson Buzz

Our fruit and vegetables need pollinators to visit their flowers to develop fruit. The more pollinator visits, the larger and more numerous the crop. Some familiar crops which Honeybees pollinate are strawberries, blue berries, apples, zucchinis, and pumpkins.

However, tomatoes need "buzz pollinators" such as native Blue Banded bees.

🔽 You can encourage Blue Banded bees in your garden by providing clay filled pipes for nesting and Lavender, Abelia, Buddleia and Salvia plants for food.

Bees will die without watereach hive drinks ½ litre per day. Bees cannot swim and can drown in deep water if there are no sticks, stones or corks to help them climb out. They drink with their tongues which are hollow like a straw. A dripping sprinkler is a popular water source in summer.





🄽 Feral beehives in tree hollows can now be reported on the eWasp app. If the current outbreak of Varroa mite spreads to the ACT, this record will be valuable in assisting management and control.

Planning Group Report-November 2022

"There was movement at the station...."

Things are starting to happen! After a slow first half year there is some movement.

Block 76. The Suburban Land Agency has announced that tenders open in mid January 2023 for the main section of block 76. It will be sold as one piece **excluding** the tree line, demonstration housing block and playground footprint. This is effectively about 50% of the block being sold as one parcel. They will be running a design based tender with 50 % weighting to design, 30% to price and 20% to other factors. There will be an emphasis on "sustainable and innovative design" with the tender process allowing the planners to go back to applicants to fine tune or clarify areas of their design. Tenders will awarded in August 2023. There will still need to be normal planning processes before anything is built.

Block 74 is not included in the current 5-year indicative land release program. That can change but Block 74 is not on the radar at this stage.

Block 3; Section 95 – This is the Car O Tel site on Aspinall St from CCC church up to Antill St. Purdon Planning, acting for the owners, are seeking a Territory Plan Variation to change the zoning of the Block from its current CZ6 (Leisure and Accommodation Zone) to a Residential Zone. It is a 3 ½ hectare site with their indicative plans showing about 140 dwellings (80 apartments, 60 single dwelling blocks.) Any plans, however, are purely indicative of what **might** go onto the site. They are **not** planning proposals. There are 3 very old mature trees on site which would be retained. Given the surrounding area it's hard to see how they will not be successful in their application. The key will be what is done after the re-zoning. We will need to watch closely.

Kamberra – Public Feedback on TPV DV383. This is technically in Lyneham but is only a stone's throw from Watson. It is a 12 ½ hec site stretching from the VET hospital along Federal Hwy to Flemington Rd. They propose up to 2,000 dwellings (multi-life stage plus commercial spaces plus health and ageing services.) 300plus 3br dwellings; 800plus 2br dwellings. The proposal has 3 storeys at front moving to 6 storeys at the rear. Our current concerns are – given that we also have Canberra Racing Club and Yowani both flagging large developments is this small area being overdeveloped? What will be the impact on Sullivan's Creek? It is spruiked as "close to light rail." Do we have sufficient light rail capacity? Not Watson but worth watching **

Gardening for all abilities

A neighbor uses a long-handled pick upper to pull weeds in her front garden and it's such a good idea it got me thinking about other ways to make gardening more accessible for everyone.

Gardening has so many benefits as a source of physical exercise and mental stimulation, it also brings joy and reduces stress and can be a nutritious activity if you like to eat what you sow. However, it can be tough on the joints and difficult for people with reduced mobility or disabilities. Digging to plant or turn over beds, weeding, mowing, planting and pruning are all physically demanding and risk strain or injury.

Here are some tips but an occupational therapist could provide specific solutions and designing or modifying a garden for accessibility should consider the needs of the person and their abilities.



Similar to my neighbour using a pick upper to weed, a spoon attached to the end of a hard length of pvc pipe (or cardboard at a pinch) can be used to plants seeds while seated or without bending. Tools that are light and have long handles can be easier for those with less strength or mobility in the hands, and tools can be adapted with forearm supports.

In the garden, raised beds can be useful for wheelchair users or to reduce bending, also consider using the no dig method of layering organic materials (google will have examples of what to use). Sitting on a low stool or crate or kneeling on a mat can be more comfortable for prolonged weeding or

planting sessions and wheels (on a barrow, cart or pots) are invaluable. Growing flowers or veggies in containers at a good height or vertically on walls can be more manageable as they require less digging and soil **

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
