The Watson Community Association Inc. (WCA Inc.) aims to promote, protect and enhance the social, cultural and physical environment of the community of Watson, and the welfare, community spirit and quality of life of its residents.

It also aims to inform the community about issues concerning Watson. One way the WCA Inc. does this is through the quarterly production and distribution of the Watzon – a community newsletter.

Woodland Working Group report

The Woodlands Working Group was formed as a sub-group of the WCA Inc. to protect, enhance and care for the valuable patch of threatened native Yellow Box/Red Gum Grassy Woodland known as Justice Robert Hope Park. Much work has been done over the past years to decrease the effects of years of commercial use, and increase the component of indigenous species of flora and fauna in the Park.

At the end of August members of the working group prepared holes and planted 90 *Acacia* and *Bursaria* shrub seedlings. Over late winter, Parks and Conservation employed a contractor to thoroughly treat the rabbit burrows in the park, which has been very successful.

An extremely wet September has delayed working bees and grown an extremely fine crop of exotic grasses and weeds in parts of the reserve from existing plants and new plants from the remnant seed bank. Weed treatment continued in the 1000 square metre experiment enclosure and surrounds where some of the more uncommon species have been planted. Every new species added to the park is creating a little more biodiversity. It is extremely pleasing to note that some specimens have started to reproduce from seed into weeded areas in the enclosure. We are hoping to replicate this experiment in other areas within the park but it requires a lot of hard work, diligence and patience.

Please remember that Justice Robert Hope Park is a dog-on-leash area reserved for the benefit of our native animals and plants. The kangaroos seem to have temporarily gone up to higher ground after the wet spell. In the barer areas of the park you might be lucky enough to see the odd Blue Tongue, Shingleback, Bearded Dragon (lizards) or even an Echidna. While collecting a water sample opposite Roma Mitchell Street, a tadpole was seen in the water proving once again that it is a good breeding ground. Also an Apostlebird was noted feeding on the margins of the dam. This must have been an off-target migrant. Apostlebird's are not cited in the Canberra Ornithologist Group's bird book for the ACT.

An order for around 400 seedlings has been placed with Greening Australia for next year's winter-spring planting. Parks and Conservation will be assisting the working group by preparing the holes for planting and with labour. Watson's high fliers – our precious native birds

We hope you enjoy learning about the beautiful birds that we sometimes see (and hear) in our Watson gardens and neighbouring bushland.

Owls by Julie Smith

Over the years, residents have enjoyed listening to the calls of owls such as the Tawny Frogmouth, as well as occasional sightings of the Southern Boobook. In years gone by the Powerful Owl, now rarely seen, may also have been heard.

Tawny Frogmouth Owls nested on the Stirling Avenue reserve a year or so ago. They have also been seen in other Canberra suburbs such as Ainslie. They are very difficult to spot, but you may hear them. Reported sightings are more likely in summer on sites near Canberra's nature reserves. They have large territories. Family groups may be up to five birds.

The evocative call of the **Southern Boobook Owl** is occasionally heard at night in Watson throughout the summer. They live in pairs and hunt at night over a large territory, roosting during the day in thick bushy trees. Sightings are recorded mostly in spring to early summer.

The **Powerful Owl** is rarely seen these days, though they were recorded visitors to Turner in 2015 (http://www.abc.net.au/news/2015-03-03/powerful-owl-in-haig-park/6277956). Powerful Owls have been heard by residents in Watson in the past decade, but deprived of suitable native bushland in which to hunt and breed, this bird is now counted as only a 'rare breeding resident' in the ACT, and may never be seen or heard by our children or grandchildren.

Planning update

Major developments in progress

As detailed in the last issue of the Watzon, three major developments are in progress in North Watson – developments which will increase the number of dwellings in Watson by approximately 15%.

- In September there was another public consultation for the development of the Channel 9 site (next to the Carotel) and in October representatives for development met with members of the WCA Inc.
- No further news has been received about the development at the Carotel. A Colliers
 International board was erected at the Negus Street / Roma Mitchell Crescent site at the
 end of October advertising development on the site.
- Other large developments on Watson's doorstep include: the Kamberra site with further
 public consultations scheduled in November and December 2016 and February 2017 (for
 further details see www.kamberraonfederal.com.au); and the Canberra Park Resort with
 work well underway on the corner of Wells Station Road and the Federal Highway.

The WCA Inc. will continue to work with the developers wherever possible to encourage developments that complement the surrounding neighbourhood and provide community infrastructure – pathways, public gardens an play grounds.

A master plan for Watson

To ensure developments as a collective complement our suburb, and public amenity is developed for the increased population, the WCA Inc. is lobbying the ACT Government to provide a comprehensive master plan for Watson.

The older section of Watson contains about 1300 households. Development over the last 12 years has increased the number of households by over 1200 - meaning residences in Watson have nearly doubled. This is a significant degree of change. It cannot be presumed that the infrastructure that currently exists will be sufficient with the number of households set to rise by a further 15% in North Watson.

Furthermore, the developments over recent years, and in progress at the moment are ad hocwith little coordination of development in relation to community infrastructure – pathways, parks and gardens and playgrounds.

In July the WCA Inc. wrote to the Chief Minister requesting a comprehensive master plan for Watson. A copy of that letter is available for you to read at Pages 8-9. While no substantive response had been received at the time of printing the Watzon, the WCA Inc. continues to lobby the new government.



Recipe

On Watson's doorstep each Saturday morning is the Capital Region Farmers Market - held at EPIC and run by the Rotary Club of Hall.

The WCA Inc. are pleased to be able to bring you another recipe from the Rotary Club of Hall's "Capital Region Farmers Market Recipe Book".

This recipe is courtesy of regular and long term contributors Minto Galloways who rear their animals just 15 km from the Market. The cattle are entirely raised on a diet of grass or hay, and no GM food is used, nor are they grain fed.

Steak "Auld Reekie"

(a traditional Scottish recipe for 4)

- Four 250 g fillets of Galloway steak
- 4 tablespoons Scotch whisky
- 350 g double cream
- 125 g grated smoked cheese
- 25 g butter
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Pan fry the steaks according to preference (rare, medium) and keep warm
- 2. Pour whisky into a pan and flame (take care when setting light to the whisky).
- Add cream and grated cheese and bring slowly to a simmering point. Continue to gently simmer, stirring from time to time, until the sauce has been reduced by half.
- 4. Season with salt and pepper, and mix in the butter for extra flavour.
- 5. Pour sauce over the steaks and serve with a selection of fresh vegetables.



My Watson

Watson was my childhood home. I was born in the Canberra Hospital in 1969 - when it overlooked Lake Burley Griffin, and my dear Mum still lives in the same house where I grew up. The same house, in fact, that my parents built in Piddington Street in 1963. Whenever I visit I find myself reminiscing, I realise that those memories are quite deeply emotional and indeed shaped me into the person I am today.

There is a book by Margaret Balderson entitled "Ä Dog called George". The first page describes, from memory, an "airstrip" behind Piddington Street. This was my back yard and was affectionately known by our family and many others as "the back track". Many a tree has been climbed, cubby houses built, tricycles and bicycles crashed, mushrooms picked, dogs walked and horses ridden along the back track over the years. I don't know how Margaret knew about this special place ... perhaps someone can shed some light? I was always proud of the fact that the back track was famous enough to be mentioned in a real book!

I do recall the park at the top end of Holroyd Street. It has changed location slightly and I am sure the local kids would be envious to hear that we used to have THE biggest, THE longest slippery slide in Canberra! Well, I don't know that for a fact but I have never seen one like it. We also had the highest set of swings I have ever seen, before or since. And a sensational seesaw! It didn't turn, it wasn't on springs — it was just a plank of wood with a handle at each end and it provided hours of delight for all of the neighbourhood kids. Does anyone have any photos of the old park?

Some things haven't changed. The scout hall on Simpson Street has had a coat of paint and it's lovely to see Majura Primary School (nee Watson Primary) still alive with children's laughter. Mrs Chapman, you were my primary school teacher and my inspiration. I fell off those monkey bars and had my first kiss in those school grounds. Mount Majura was my Everest, the Starlight drivein was my Saturday night and the Showground, now EPIC, was my Disneyland with horse shows, roller skating and the Cha Cha when the Show was on. It was \$1 a ride back then!

My Dad was environmentally active and was partly responsible for saving the Woodland area in North Watson, now known as Justice Robert Hope Park. I make a point of visiting this special place whenever I'm in Canberra and I'm sure he would be pleased to see people utilising the park and understanding its significance. It has been used by geocachers and who knows, there may even be a Pokemon hiding there!

It is warming for me to see so many new families moving into Watson. The trendy eateries at the shops and the markets on Saturday mornings generate a wonderful vibrancy in the community.

I hope you enjoy making your memories here as much as I did. Watson is now in your hands.

Hints for your summer garden - with Cedric Bryant

- Check and flush all drip irrigation systems. Lift drip lines [which may have become buried] on top of the soil and under mulch.
- Plant lemon or lime trees into a well-drained soil in full sun.
- Mulch all garden beds without delay using Canberra Organic Mulch from Canberra Sand and Gravel (Vicars Street, Mitchell).
- Plant petunias for summer colour. It takes about eight weeks from planting to full flowering provided the plants have been fed regularly. Maxicrop seaweed plant nutrient is ideal.
- Now that spring flowering shrubs have finished flowering give a light trim, up to but not more than one third off at any time.
- Apply an organic spray for mildew on roses, vegies, etc. Mix one part full cream milk with eight parts water. Spray on top and under the leaves. Repeat in two weeks.
- New to Canberra or gardening? Buy a copy of The Canberra Gardener, written for local conditions by the Horticultural Society. Available from newsagents and bookshops.







Summernats 2017

Summernats is an annual motor festival held at EPIC in early January, and attracting large crowds from interstate, as well as locally. Previously, Watson residents in the vicinity of EPIC have raised concerns principally around noise, smell and visitor behaviour.

The WCA Inc. has worked with the Summernats organisers over several years - raising these concerns and establishing a less combative relationship. In response, Summernats have made a number of changes over the years to minimise the effects on locals. The number of complaints has decreased, presumably as a result of these actions, though there are some weather factors such as wind strength and direction which mitigate the impact.

The WCA Inc. recommends Watson residents report any concerns during the event by contacting **Access Canberra** on **13 22 81** – the official government process. Access Canberra will on-forward any reports it receives to the Summernats organisers.

During the event, a representative of WCA Inc., along with other stakeholders, will attend a meeting each evening with Summernats organisers. The WCA Inc. will also use this forum to report any concerns to the Summernats organisers.

News from YWAM (Youth with a Mission)

Dear Chief Minister,

I am writing on behalf of the Watson Community Association (WCA) to request that the Environment and Planning Directorate initiate a process involving the WCA and the Watson community in developing a coordinated plan for the expanding suburb of Watson. At present there appears to be no overall planning of current and future demands on physical and social infrastructure for the suburb.

Watson is a very attractive suburb with a blend of old and new, diverse organisations and businesses, a valuable and much loved reserved woodland (Justice Robert Hope Park) adjoining Canberra Nature Park, and an active and committed community. It is close to the city and the upcoming light rail.

The suburb is now 50 years old but has seen increasing change from open space to residential areas over the past few years. Watson is unusual in the ACT as it is one of Canberra's oldest suburbs but still contains undeveloped space in the area previously planned for commercial tourist and recreation developments in North Watson. Development in this area is now rapidly occurring with no overall plan in place. New greenfield suburbs are planned with knowledge of expected population and infrastructure required, but older suburbs such as Watson are currently vulnerable to unplanned population expansion without reference to infrastructure needs.

The development that has occurred in Watson over the last 12 years has increased the number of households by over 1200. The older section of Watson contains about 1300 households meaning that the number of residences has almost doubled in a decade. This is a significant degree of change. It cannot be presumed that infrastructure exists, or will continue to exist, with sufficient capacity at contemporary community standards.

Furthermore, each of the many separate developments over recent years has been ad hoc, with little coordination of development in relation to community infrastructure such as pathways for pedestrian and cycling activity, pre-school and school capacity, traffic flow and speeds, parking capacity, commercial development, aged care facilities and public amenities such as toilets, meeting rooms, play areas and community gardens.

In addition, ad hoc development has incremental effects on wildlife and protected parkland in the precinct. As you are no doubt aware, Watson adjoins parts of the Majura Nature Park, which is an endangered ecological community. We also have a long history of community interest in protecting and enhancing the Justice Robert Hope Park. The continued chipping away at the integrity of this community through developments on its edges has potentially serious consequences for their viability and connectedness, and is taken very seriously by this community.

A forward thinking plan will better guide future development and will reduce the time, effort and anxiety of the planning department, the developers and the community in considering each new individual proposal. Currently there is one new development approved (approximately 100 dwellings) and the WCA is aware of a further three significant proposals.

Especially in view of current developments in Dickson, Downer, the light rail and the City and Gateway Urban Renewal, we think there is an urgent need to ensure that development in Watson is appropriately planned and coordinated, and reflects community aims and needs.

We would appreciate the opportunity to meet and discuss a process for the local community to be involved in the development of an appropriate master plan for Watson, and hope that a commitment can be made by government well before the election date.
