The mosaic at our Watson shops

The story of the mosaic

Construction of the mosaic took place in the year 2000 - the start of a new millennium – and was the result of a community effort. The mosaic, designed by Tony Steel and Tess Horwitz, with assistance from Steven Hollard, celebrates the diversity of Watson: colleges, schools, church, youth mission, TV stations, farms, houses, potter's society and shops. George Paton did the historical research and organised community groups.

The Canberra Potters Society (Christine Pearson, Judy McDonald, Marlene Flanagan, Jeanette Hodgkinson, Nyla Walkear and Liz Dorrough) made the image and text tiles. The children of Rosary and Majura schools provided the tile designs. The Foundation for Independence program at Dickson College made the fauna and landscape mosaic sections. The people of Watson generously donated broken pottery.

Waste or resource?

'Sustainability is not about holding back and living less - but achieving more with the resources we already have.'

The above is a quote from the website of the "world's first recycling Mall". It is just outside Stockholm and offers a complete recycling experience. Drop off – donate – something and then shop from 14 shops all selling refurbished, repaired and reclaimed items. There is also a cafe selling organic food and drink. Interestingly, it is run by the local municipality and sited next to the recycling centre. An upmarket Green Shed, perhaps? Google *ReTuna* for further information.

Packaging

Doesn't it just make you mad to have to unpeel plastic, cut cardboard, dispose of tiny hangers and cut off labels? Opening a packet of batteries inevitably results in cuts and scratches! Undies and socks are frequently double, or triple, wrapped and hung on those mini hangers. But it doesn't have to be like that. It is possible to buy underwear with no packaging and socks with just a staple pairing them. Change your shopping habits to make a difference.

Bulk food stores are great because you can take your own containers – glass jars, recycled plastic boxes, paper bags, etc. or buy jars/bags from the store, and – you only buy as much as you want! The nearest one to Watson is 'the source' in Dickson and there is one in Braddon and at the ANU. Other suburbs have them too.

Sell or donate?

If you don't want to donate your better clothing to Vinnies or Salvos there are a couple of places where you can sell it such as the Designer Op Shop or Material Pleasures and, of course, Gumtree. Trash and Treasure markets are useful and good fun as also are garage sales and the chance of making a little money is always tempting. If you leave 'freebies' at the kerb for passers-by to pick over please don't leave it there indefinitely. Much better to donate these items or take them to the recycling centre in Mitchell. The ACT Government runs a once-a-year, free bulky waste pick up for Veterans and Seniors. Call 02 6249 7974 or email bulkygoods@gmail.com to book a collection and check what they will take.

Planet Ark

I'm sure we've all seen the ads for Planet Ark recycling printer cartridges. What a great idea! They make eWood raised garden beds and TonerPave road surfacing from them. The ACT is trialling this road surface material and also recycled tyres. You can drop off printer cartridges at JB Hi-Fi, Good Guys, Office Works and some Australia Post shops. Planet Ark love to recycle Christmas cards too!


Food

Oz Harvest in Canberra collects 9,000 to 10,000 kilograms of excess food per week in Canberra. Many of our cafes, restaurants and retailers are involved in this. You can become a volunteer with them but you can also donate food. I ran a function where we had unopened, non-perishable food left over and I dropped it in to them. Just a small amount but welcome. Their vans whip around Canberra and you can arrange a pick up by phoning them.

If you 'grow your own' I'm sure you give away excess to your family and neighbours. What a pleasure for the recipients. And don't the compost worms just love the scraps!

In the recent Watson Community Survey, we asked:

- As part of a redevelopment of Canberra Technology Park (the old Watson High School site)
 other facilities are also being considered. What do you think would most improve this area?'
- What activities or facilities would you like to see supported in Watson's green spaces?
- Do you have any further comments things you would like to see developed in Watson not previously covered in the survey (gym, pub, bike repair, health food etc.)?

150 innovative suggestions were collated by WCA Inc. members and six prize winners were drawn randomly. Three of the six prize winners were presented with their \$50 Watson Supa Express gift vouchers on 12 October by Liz Grace (Chair, WCA Inc.).

Among the innovative suggestions were:

- "The powerline park could be so much more if the drainage ditch was turned into a sort of wetland (like in Dickson or Lyneham) and the area was landscaped with graded tracks and shrubs, and maybe even exercise stations and play areas
- "Antill Street is 80 km/hr and there is no pedestrian crossing or safe passage to (exit the "Fair) the bus stop on Aspinall Street
- "Wide pedestrian / cycle ways on both sides of Antill Street extending from the Fair around past the Channel 7 studios and onto the Majura walking trails
- "Asphalting Mount Majura car park (on Antill Street)
- "There are loads of kids on bikes, dirt jumps in the open green spaces would be great
- "A postal box in North Watson near the Fair / Solstice already > 500 residences and no postbox
- "A crossing at Piddington Street (linking North Watson and the park / green space) so the kids can cross safely and travel down to the schools
- "A place to recycle soft plastics at the local Watson shops
- "Exercise stations and a walking / running track (preferably pram friendly) through the green spaces with exercise stations along the way.

Recipe

On Watson's doorstep each Saturday morning is the Capital Region Farmers Market - held at EPIC and run by the Rotary Club of Hall.

The WCA Inc. are pleased to be able to bring you another verbatim recipe from the Rotary Club of Hall's "Capital Region Farmers Market Recipe Book".

This is courtesy of Peter and Caroline O'Clery, Homeleigh Grove. They started planting an olive grove at Hall in 1999, and have established a multiaward business. Peter was one of the team that started the market in 2004, and Homeleigh Grove has been a constant presence since.

Pan-fried salmon goujonettes on a bed of sesame hummus drizzled with Homeleigh Grove lemon myrtle-infused olive oil

Hommus

500 g chickpeas cooked in stock

- 125 g yoghurt
- 2 pressed garlic cloves
- 1 juiced lemon
- 2 soupspoons of tahini (sesame paste)

Cayenne pepper, salt, pepper, cumin to taste

Salmon marinade

- 1 kg fresh salmon, boned, skin off and sliced into
- 2 cm-wide lengths (goujonettes)
- 250 ml Homeleigh Grove (med) extra virgin olive oil
- 1 teaspoon of cumin
- 1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon

Drizzle 250 ml Homeleigh Grove lemon myrtle-infused olive oil.

Mix all the marinade ingredients together with the salmon and marinade overnight in a small container.

To make the hummus, puree the chickpeas and mix with the yoghurt, tahini, olive oil, lemon juice and seasoning. If it is too thick, add water from the chickpeas. Sieve and keep aside.

Remove the salmon from the marinade, pan fry in olive oil until "pink" (cooked).

To serve, spoon some hummus onto plates, top with salmon and drizzle with lemon myrtle olive oil.

Hints for your summer garden – with Cedric Bryant

The "experts" are predicting a hot dry summer; let us hope they are wrong. Did you know that the average annual rainfall here is 620mm and the annual evaporation is a staggering 1800mm! So let us concentrate on watering.

With water costs constantly increasing it is important not to waste it. Drip irrigation is the only effective way to water your plants where the water is taken directly to the root zone. Overhead sprinklers or hand watering [except for pot plants] is the least effective, merely wetting the mulch only to be evaporated on a hot day.

Dripper lines should be on top of the soil and under the mulch.

If you already have a drip system it is vital to check the system now. It should have a tap at the end of the line to enable the system to be flushed out. The best and cheapest way to check the system is place a two litre ice-cream container under one of the drippers/emitters. These are spaced every 30cm and deliver 2 litres/ hour. So, in one hours operation the ice cream container should be full. If it is only half full or less at the end of one hour it is almost certain there is a hole in the line.

You can also check by digging a hole near some plants and see where the moisture level is.

Normally on days of between 20-25c one hour once a week is normally sufficient. Days over that it is recommended two hours once a week. Ideally operate the system an hour in the morning and an hour in the evening.

The WCA Inc. recommends Watson residents report any concerns during the event by contacting **Access Canberra** on **13 22 81** – the official government process. Access Canberra will on forward any reports it receives to the Summernats organisers.

During the event, a representative of WCA Inc., along with other stakeholders, will attend a meeting each evening with Summernats organisers. The WCA Inc. will also use this forum to report any concerns to the Summernats organisers.



Woodland Working Group report

The Woodlands Working Group was formed as a sub-group of the WCA Inc. to protect, enhance and care for the valuable patch of threatened native Yellow Box/Red Gum Grassy Woodland known as Justice Robert Hope Park. Much work has been done to decease the effects of years of commercial use, and increase indigenous species of flora and fauna in the park.

The working group has been fairly quiet over the last several months. It was a dry and cold August and September. There were two working bees in September to water and weed new plantings in our trial plot enclosure and shrubs planted in 2016 and 2017 working bees. Watering and weeding continued in October. We are raising kangaroo grass seedlings from seed harvested in 2016. Kangaroo grass seeds need to be cured for at least a year and for up to three years after harvesting to get a good strike rate. We intend to use these seedlings in additional trial plot areas.

On 14 October, two senior members of the working group met with two officers of the ACT government environmental offset implementation team to discuss: another round of planting; and the ongoing works programs. We discussed the indicative 2018 plant list and rabbit and weed control. John Briggs made suggestions on substitutions for some of the plants on the 2018 plant list. We were reassured to hear that rabbit and weed control would be undertaken this financial year. We learned that \$15,000 was available to create new interpretive signs, money to continue control of *Phalaris* and scoping for a wheelchair accessible walking trail through the park. A suggestion was presented on the location of the walking trail. We are pleased that input from the working group is valued by the ACT government environmental offset implementation team.
