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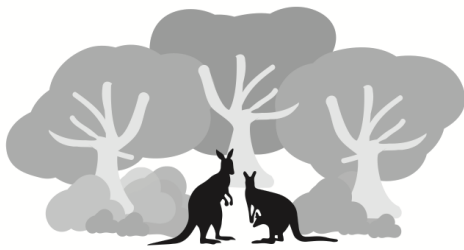

Report – AGM

The WCA Inc. Annual General Meeting was held on Thursday, 21 March 2019 at the Community Hall in North Watson. Around 20 members of the WCA Inc. were there to elect the 2019 Committee, provide an update on the WCA Inc. finances and hear from our various working groups, including the Planning Subcommittee, Woodlands, Watzon, and Watson Community Gatherings.

Two longstanding committee members were farewelled and thanked for their invaluable contribution over the years: Liz Grace and Richard Larson. Two new members were elected and warmly welcomed to the Committee; Megan Mears and Simon Clarke.

The WCA Inc. supported and officially accepted the Planning Subcommittee's draft Plan for the Sustainable Development of Watson and their considerable effort developing the Plan was acknowledged by the Chair of WCA Inc., Leonie Watts. The next steps will be working towards an effective promotional strategy for the Plan.

Woodlands Working Group have been busy over the past year spending the spring and summer spraying invasive weeds and raising and planting seedlings to complement individual pre-existing plants. A recent assessment and enhancement report completed on the two water bodies in the reserve and the Operational Management Plan for the area can be accessed through the Environment and Sustainable Development Directorate website.

The Watzon reached a very significant milestone in February this year... our 100th edition! Making the WCA one of, if not the only, Canberra community association to have such a long record of continuous communication with our residents. Be sure to read this issue's Looking Back section, where we revisit stories published in the Watzon between editions 26 to 50.

There were two Watson Community picnics over the past year; Picnic on the amphitheatre section of the oval with the Canberra City Band in spring and the Summer Evening Dog Lover's picnic at the Wetlands; attended by families and also Canberra Veterinary Hospital and ACT Rescue and Foster. Two more events will be held this year – stay tuned for details in the Watzon and WCA Facebook page.

Looking back ... editions 26-50 of the Watzon

This is the second in our series looking back at Watzon's earlier editions. In early 2019, we published the 100th edition. Here we look at issues 26-50.

From 2000 to 2005, the period covered by these issues, planning and development remained high on the agenda of local issues, including the Watson Woodlands and North Watson development, the Local Area Planning Advisory Committees ('LAPACs') and Community Value Statements and Neighbourhood Plans, the Shops refurbishment and the future of the Watson High School site. This was a time of bushfires and drought, so Watzon contained a thank you to firefighters, and stories on kangaroos at risk of collisions, Open Gardens and began offering gardening tips. The hugely popular Downer Bike Track came, then went (killed by the public liability insurance crisis), and Blair Street had a fabulous community party. There was an item in the Watzon on 'road rage' and a proposed dragstrip at Majura, and we reported on Canberra 'milkos' delivering milk to Watson households in 2005. Perennial local issues such as EPIC noise, Summernats, and the Canberra International Airport were also covered, along with items on roads and traffic, cycle tracks, wandering dogs, the Mitchell Incinerator, Owls and Swift Parrots, Canberra Ornithologists Group and minimising Myna birds, missing street signs, dangerous footpaths, illegal rubbish dumping and wood collecting on Stirling Reserve and elsewhere, Stirling Avenue access, and a variety of other issues elaborated below. Our very own WCA chair, Stan Cronin, received Australia Day Honours in 2003 (edition 44).

The Watzon continued to report on the many community activities in Watson - including the Potters Society, Scouts, Majura Women's Group, the Australian Breastfeeding Association, Neighbourhood Watch, Meg's Toy Box, the North Canberra Community Council, Friends of Mt Majura, PAWS, Probus and ACT for Trees.

Watzon also reported regularly on happenings at Rosary and Majura Primary Schools, Watson Pre-School, the CIT and the ACU. The ACU hit the news for its path-breaking policy of offering 52 weeks paid maternity leave to staff (edition 36).

- Rosary celebrated NAIDOC, had outings to Tuross Beach, Sports and Swim days, Christmas Carols and Concerts, and Graduation Days for Kindy Kids and Year 6 students, and raised thousands of dollars for children in Ethiopia.
- Majura celebrated receiving a national award for Literacy and Numeracy, and participating in Writers Festivals, Spring Carnivals and the Wakakirri song and dance festival.
- Blue Gum School started up in the old Watson High School Building before relocating to Hackett in 2003.

This was the era of LAPACs and Community Value Statements, with the Watson Neighbourhood Plan emerging from extensive local discussion. There were new concerns for the nationally endangered Regent Honeyeater when the National Heritage Village (formerly Canberra Fair) was redeveloped for housing. Lincoln Red Cedar Motel (formerly the Chinese Embassy) was redeveloped for housing, raising complaints about excessive density, lack of community space and facilities, and inadequate traffic and strategic planning for the area (edition 26). When residential development of North Watson began with the demolition of existing housing on the polocrosse field (edition 50), local residents despaired at the noise of heavy construction equipment, and dust baths for housing in existing Watson. Builders rubbish flowed over into surrounding bush and roadways. Sound familiar?

Recipe

This recipe from the “*Capital Region Farmers Market (CRFM) Recipe Book*”, published in 2014, was contributed by Barbara Baikie – a Rotarian for 14 years and member of the CRFM Committee and Coordinator of the CRFM Cookbook Committee.

Cauliflower Soup

Serves 4

1 tbs **olive oil**
3 **garlic** cloves
2 tsps ground **coriander**
1 tsp ground **cumin**
1 head of **cauliflower** (approx. 750g),
cut into florets
200g **sebago potatoes**, peeled and chopped
1 litre **chicken stock** or vegetable stock
3 cm of **blue vein cheese** (optional)
¼ cup of **cream**

Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat, add onions and garlic. Cook until soft (approx. 4 minutes).

Add ground coriander and cumin. Increase heat and cook, stirring for another two minutes, and then add cauliflower, potatoes and stock.

Bring to the boil, reduce heat and simmer for about ½ an hour until vegetables are very soft.

Remove from heat and cool slightly, use a blender to puree vegetables. Return to heat, add cream and chopped blue vein cheese.

Serve with savory muffins.

Woodlands Working Group

Can you help?

Justice Robert Hope Park, also known as Watson Woodlands, is a remnant of critically endangered Yellow Box/Red Gum grassy woodland of national significance. It is part of a larger system that stretches from Gungahlin through to Mulligans Flat, Goorooyarroo and Mount Majura Nature Reserves.

How the Woodlands were won

The existence of Watson Woodlands is due to long term community action and the commitment of residents led by the WCA Inc. from 1992. Over the decade, this action took the form of writing multiple reports, submissions and grant applications. It also included meetings, several public rallies and campaigns. Notably, the 'Walk for Watson Woodlands' picnic rally was held in April 2000. In March 2001, over 200 people gathered to hear conservationist Phillip Toyne speak on the value of the Watson Woodlands, and in May, soon to become Environment Minister Simon Corbell announced the ALP would reserve most of the area. After almost a decade of effort, the 15 hectare Justice Robert Hope Park came into being in July 2002.

What's been happening since?

Having obtained a small Bushcare grant in 2001, the main role of the Woodlands Working Group has been organising working bees for weeding, watering and planting trees and shrubs. The Working Group liaises with rangers and administration staff from ACT Parks and Conservation Service (PCS). Long term convenor Richard Larsen also attended WCA Inc. meetings and contributed articles about the woodlands to the Watson.

Can you help?

The WCA Inc. is looking for a Woodlands Working Group convenor to monitor the woodlands – convene the small working group and engage with ACT PCS staff. Ideally the convenor would take an active interest in the park and update the community through contributions in the WATZON. While Richard has been thanked in person for his enormous contribution to the Watson Woodlands, we would also like to publicly acknowledge his many years of committed work, attention to detail and the valuable skills he brought to the role as campaigner and convenor of the Woodlands.

Richard also served as chair of WCA Inc. and held other committee roles at various times. He will be greatly missed at the WCA Inc. We wish him and Bev all the best for the future and their move north.

Looking back ... editions 26-50 of the Watzon (cont'd)

- The shops were refurbished, and there was a fuss about plans to release the nearby green space for commercial development. Plans were withdrawn (editions 26-28).
- A developer proposed a club and gaming machines for the High School Oval. This too was withdrawn as community resistance gained momentum (editions 32 and 34). At this time, the CIT in Reid held the lease over the old Watson High School Building, but found it costly to run; millions had been spent on removing asbestos after it closed in the 1980s.
- AIE, which ran 3D graphic design training programs for CIT, took over the building lease. Canberra City Band practiced there still.
- There was ongoing discussion about spillovers of noise, rubbish and parking from EPIC, including from fireworks.
- Plans emerged for EPIC redevelopment (editions 32, 37-38 and 49).
- Reducing the unacceptable disruptions associated with Summernats remained a major preoccupation for the WCA Inc. and local residents over this period, with considerable improvement due to strong advocacy to government, EPIC and Summernats organisers by WCA Inc. representatives.

The Watson Woodlands

Meanwhile, the big issue of the time, reported at length in the Watzon was the Watson Woodlands campaign and residential development at North Watson. In April 2000 (edition 29), there was a 'Walk for Watson Woodlands' attended by 100 people, many contributing funds to the WCA Inc. campaign to save the red gum yellow box grassy woodland area at the northern end of the suburb from residential development (first proposed in 1992). There were also petitions, garage sales, a survey, and a determined pre-election campaign from 2000-2001 including a mail campaign of around 2000 postcards to key Ministers in the Carnell government.

A turning point was the influential launch of a scientific study, 'The Ecological Values of the Watson Woodlands', at the ACT Assembly in July 2000 (edition 31). Reading this report resulted in 'an epiphany' by the ALP opposition spokesperson Simon Corbell. At the March 2001 Picnic Rally on Stirling Reserve, leading national environmentalist Phillip Toyne called for 'a line in the sand' to be drawn against this environmental destruction. In front of the local audience of some 200 people, Corbell announced the ALP would preserve the Woodland.

A 2001, Bushcare grant assisted remediation of the area from this time. After working with WCA Inc. campaign leader Julie Smith and many others during the 1990s to secure this important remnant native woodland and obtain funding for materials, Martin Grace stepped forward to lead the volunteer working group, with our expert advisor, John Briggs. A small area of the Woodlands was gazetted as a park on 26 July 2002. WCA Inc. efforts on the Woodland culminated in November 2005 in a major event celebrating the official declaration of 18 hectares of the Watson Woodland as the 'Justice Robert Hope Park', at which luminaries including the former Liberal Environment Minister Gary Humphries praised our sustained and effective campaign. The former government had received a derisory community response to announcing that just 5 hectares of the native woodland would be preserved, within a planned development of several hundred dwellings. Now the politics had caught up with the science.

Canberra Technology Park and Watson Oval (old Watson High School site)

You'll have received a card in the mail from ACT Government noting their intention to negotiate sale of the site to Academy of Interactive Entertainment, with a provision for retaining green space for the community. We are preparing a response to the Government with list of questions and considerations and outlining our case for a suite of community facilities to be built in the green space under the title 'Watson Village'. We will share this with the community via Facebook and forums. Feedback, concerns, or suggestions welcomed.

Canberra City Gateway

Watson will be impacted by the Governments proposed developments in this key corridor in the entrance to Canberra (which includes blocks 74, and 76 along the Federal Highway). We have invited representatives from the National Capital Authority to our next meeting to discuss the status of this project and the impact for our local area. The WCA Inc. will then be developing a strategy with the community to submit to the Government.

Resident letter

WCA Inc.,

Congratulations on the 100th edition of the Watzon.

When we arrived in Watson from the United Kingdom in 1964 there were no shops - my late wife had to push the pram to Downer for shopping. The sound of cattle was heard from O'Sullivan's farm, but not the sound of birds in the treeless former paddock. However, spin-off, the unused soil grew the best tomatoes ever. I enjoyed the ice-rink across Northbourne Avenue, and occasionally the car racing at Mt. Ginn. The Drive-in, a perfect treat. The Commodore Motel gave a good meal, and for a while it was the Chinese Embassy.

When the shops started, there was a duplication of vegetable start-ups, the owners of one of them complained that no indication had been given of who the other tenants would be. Kevin the butcher remained for some time.

I liked the native vegetation in Stirling Avenue and joined in the protest for Justice Robert Hope Park. Good that Monash Drive never happened, I loved the initial uncleared state of Stirling Avenue, with its copses full of rabbits. I have a weakness for abandoned car wrecks, and I liked the old Chrysler that gradually decayed beneath vegetation.

When I found the Watzon in my letterbox this afternoon I went for a nostalgic bike ride around the suburb. Constrained development has made Watson a perfect Canberra suburb, the unique Guirgola house in Irvine Street is hidden in vegetation. The concentration of large religious establishments was initially extraordinary, the Signadou Order of nuns and the Blackfriars clergy, (if I have got that right), and the large Monastery of the Sacred Heart. The distinctive buildings now the Australian Catholic University. And now we also have C3 Church.

Watson is a wonderful place to live, and it would improve with a shopping centre on Tay Street. Alas, the iron wave of concentration is going to hit, but it has been more and more one of the most livable suburbs, made in the original Canberra plan.
